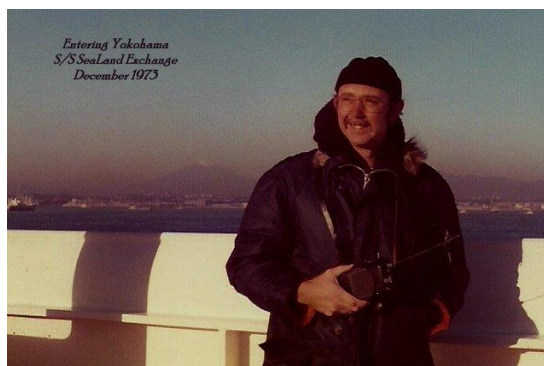


The Carriage of Goods at Sea

As a firm example, our main reference will be four cargo manifests (refrigerated and dangerous) from a two week round trip voyage to-and-from Northern Europe aboard the S/S SeaLand McClean in 1973. Included is everything from Brandy to Uranium.

Also covered will be a partial listing from a trans-Pacific voyage from Hong Kong and Japan to Seattle, WA. In carrying live animals at sea, the stories include lions, dairy cows, rhinoceros, and chickens.
